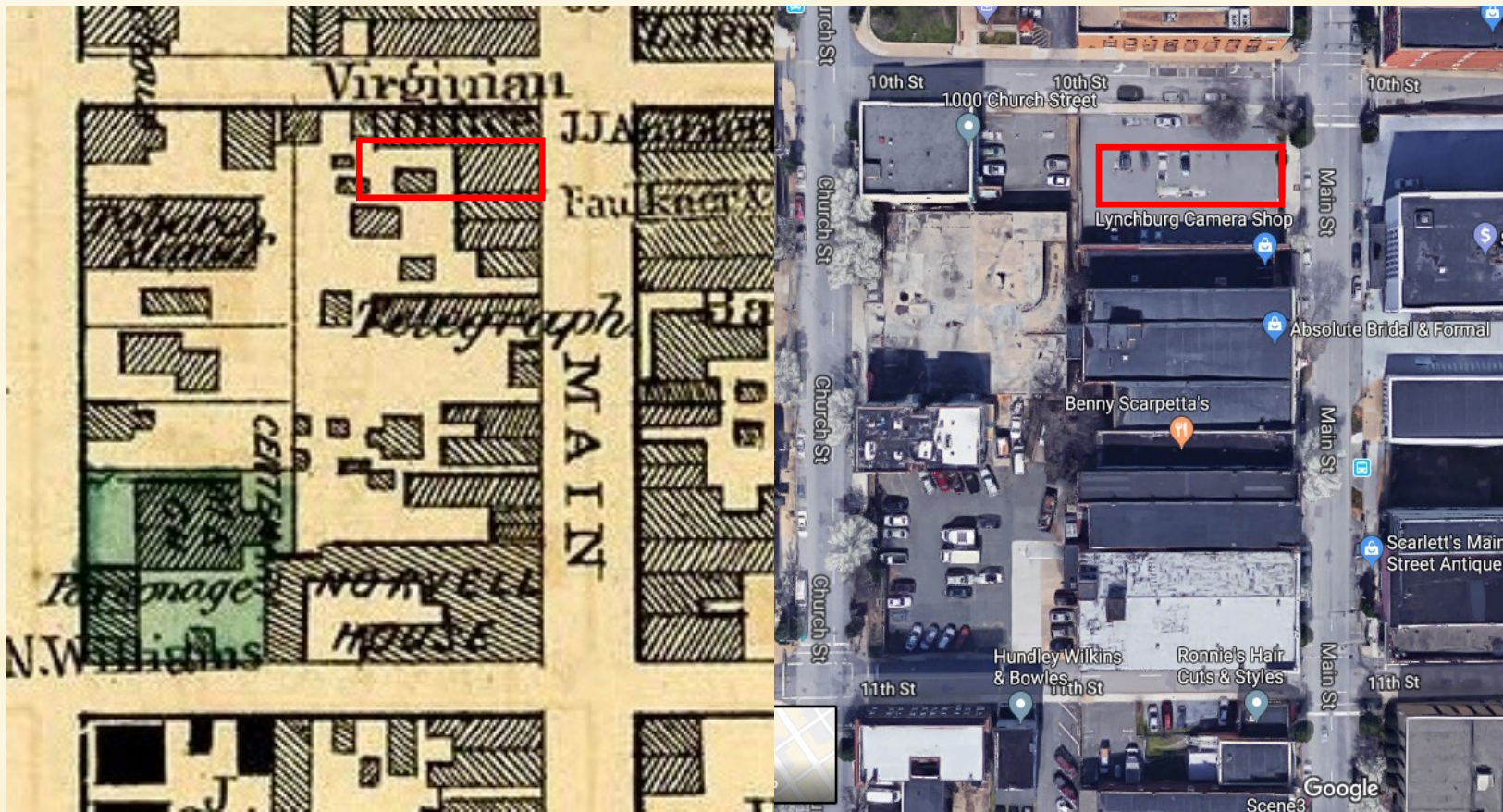


Warwick House, Warwick Hotel

One of only five hotels in the city of Lynchburg when the war began, the Warwick House was militarized as a hospital in August of 1861 by the Confederacy, and was used as such until the tobacco hospitals were opened in 1862. Aside from Diuguid burial records, little information is currently available on the Warwick House as a medical facility. It is known, however, that forty-five deaths did occur at Warwick during that year. The building no longer exists; it was located at 1003 Main Street.

Immediately after the war the Union army establish its Provost Marshall's office in the Warwick Hotel. It was there that scores of former Confederates took the oath of allegiance to the United States.



Gray's 1877 map shows the building at 1003 Main Street. Next door was the office of the local newspaper, *The Lynchburg Virginian*. Today that location is a parking lot.
