## What's New at Historic Sandusky

### Wallpaper for the entry hall!

This mid-nineteenth century wallpaper will be installed in Sandusky's entry hall this spring. Graduate Assistant Tracy holds up a sample of the reproduction French paper.



The design is a faux marble and was developed with the assistance of the Cooper-Hewitt Smithsonian Design Museum and Waterhouse Wallcoverings. Patterns showing stone, marble, or granite finishes were popular in antebellum entry halls because they presented a formal appearance and helped hide wear and tear.

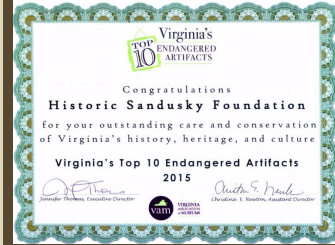
The purpose of the Top 10 Endangered Artifacts is to create awareness around the conservation and preservation of artifacts throughout Virginia and in the District of Columbia.
