House of Pestilence aka "Pest House"

The Pest House was built in the 1840s and was the place of Dr. J. J. Terrell's practice. Its name is derived from the word "pestilence," and it was a specialty hospital used to quarantine diseases that were considered to be dangerous to the general public. Such diseases include: the measles, typhoid, and most importantly smallpox. In fact, because smallpox was so prominent among patients at the Pest House, it was often referred to as the "smallpox hospital."
